From the Pastor

Last Sunday, I preached from one of my favorite passages in the Bible: Philippians 4:4-7. Easily overlooked in those helpful verses is this simple instruction in verse 5: "Let your gentleness be made known to everyone." If ever there was a time when the world is in need of gentleness, it is certainly right now. The political climate of our nation is filled with anger, aggression, and disrespect of people who do not agree with our beliefs or opinions. Issues such as race, sexuality, healthcare, and immigration are not engendering a cooperative spirit. Instead, we let the issues divide us as fellow Americans, neighbors, friends, and sometimes even as members of the same family. We are suspicious of one another and hesitant to talk about "hot topic" issues for fear of being ridiculed or criticized or hurt by someone who will disagree with us. It is an exhausting existence that is in need of a fresh and encouraging path forward.

What if that path forward is *gentleness*? That may sound naïve and even hopeless, but it is the path to which we are called if we are genuinely trying to follow Jesus. "Let your gentleness be made known to everyone," Paul said. Paul did not want us to limit our gentleness—not just to the people who are close to us; not just to the people we like; not just to the people who agree with us. We are called to be gentle, patient, forbearing with everyone. That means we seek to listen as much as we talk. It means we don't always have to be right or have the last word. We don't have to use Facebook and other social media platforms to bash other people and make our opinions known. We don't have to correct everyone or say everything that is on our minds. Gentleness with others means that we yield to other points of view and we yield to the possibility that we may be mistaken. Practicing gentleness enables us to learn from others instead of writing them off as opponents and enemies. To be gentle with one another is to confess that we cannot control the words and actions of someone else, but we can control our attitude, our words, and our actions.

One by one, we can make a difference in the world as we practice gentleness each day. Few things are more powerful or effective than a gentle spirit in the midst of loud and angry aggression. We are followers of Jesus, and I cannot think of a better way to follow Jesus than to be gentle, patient, and humble toward one another. Let your gentleness be made known to everyone.

We need *your* help!

That's right, we need your help. We are in need of several individuals who are willing to commit to helping us ring handbells. I'm sure right about now you are saying to yourself, "*I can't do it; I don't read music*" or "*Someone else will do it; I don't need to think about it*" or "*I don't have time; my plate is full!*"

Let's look at the last statement first: "*I don't have time; my plate is full!*" As we consider our stewardship to God, let's remember that stewardship is not just about giving financially. It is also about giving of our time. All of us have the same twenty-four hours every day, the same 1,440 minutes. Can we give a tithe of that time—144 minutes—each day to intentionally serving Christ and his church? Why not give 45 minutes each week to something as fun and enjoyable and fulfilling as handbell rehearsal?

Personally, I am likely to respond with, "*Someone else will do it*" when it is something that I don't want to do. It might be a matter of inconvenience, questioning the purpose of the activity, or because it is something controversial or divisive. But handbell rehearsal is more than just a time to practice music. It is a great time of Christian growth and fellowship with friends. We share our lives with each other and support each other. Think of it as another small group within the church. We have a fun time learning the music and laughing with one another over some of the "mishaps" that occur during rehearsal time!

Finally, consider the statement, "*I can't do it; I don't read music.*" Really? I bet you read music better than you think you can. Reading music is not impossible. It is much like reading in general. The more we do it, the easier it becomes. Two notes are basically all that is required to know, along with some simple rhythms. It's not rocket science by any stretch. If I can do it, ANYONE can do it! It just takes some time and commitment.

So if you are looking for a place within the church where you can spend a tithe of your time serving God, why not try handbells? No one else can do it for you, and you can do it if you will give it a shot. Who knows? You might actually like it! And always remember, God doesn't call the qualified. He qualifies the called. You can learn the techniques and notes. I'll be glad to help you learn. If you are interested, please see me or any other handbell choir member. Rehearsals are Monday afternoons at 5:30.

From the Finance Committee:

Give to the Church and Save on Your Taxes

As we approach the end of the year and what is traditionally thought of as the "season of giving," you can take advantage of a potential tax savings opportunity that will also benefit our church. If you own appreciated stock that you have held for over a year, you may want to consider giving the stock to the church instead of giving cash. By giving the stock, you will generally receive a charitable contribution deduction for the fair market value of the stock on the date that it is given, and you do not have to recognize (or pay tax on) any gain in the value of the stock since you acquired it.

For example, let's say you own stock with a value of \$5,000, and you only paid \$2,000 to acquire it. If you sell the stock, you will recognize a \$3,000 taxable gain and depending on your personal tax situation, you could owe taxes up to approximately \$750.00 on this gain. But if you choose to give the stock valued at \$5,000 to the church instead of giving the same amount in cash, you will generally still receive a charitable tax deduction of \$5,000, but with a savings of approximately \$750.00 in taxes.

Another potential tax savings opportunity is distributing funds directly from your IRA to the church. If you are interested in either of these opportunities, please contact the church office. Since everyone's tax situation is unique, you may also want to discuss these potential tax savings opportunities with your tax advisor.
